Rabbi Alan's Message...

Bubbemeisers, Oldwives tales and Superstitions

I am very often asked about witchcraft and superstitions, and what does Judaism have to say about that. In light of the Harry Potter phenomenon of the past 20 years, here are some thoughts to ponder.

Witchcraft, like idolatry, is condemned in the Torah. Sorcery and communications with evil spirits is likewise prohibited, as it is taken from paganism and not in accord with the belief in One God. Maimonides said, “That those who follow and practice superstitions are false and deceptive, and those who follow them are fools.”

As for the number “13” Judaism does not subscribe to the notion of unlucky numbers; nor do we “cross our fingers” or “cross my heart,” as crossing refers to the ‘cross!’

How often do we use the term “knock on wood?” Knocking on wood, while some jokingly hit their heads, is a cultural habit, or at least it seems so. While in the course of conversation, “knock on wood” refers to ‘something that has gone well.’ However, “knocking on wood” is untenable as a Jewish expression. The idea of touching wood is related to the wooden cross, where the cross brings good luck. It is Christian in origin, not Jewish.


Many Yiddish speakers use the expression “poo poo” as their way of hoping that everything will be fine. Jews are best off using the phrase “bli ayin hara” (without an evil eye); expressing the desire that no one will cast an evil eye when things have gone well.

We have all grown up with all kinds of superstitions. Do you still believe in Santa Claus? What are your superstitions? Someone recently told me that they come to the synagogue on the High Holy Days, just in case; whatever that means.

New Council is Sworn In Lesser Re-Elected Mayor

WETHERSFIELD - Last Monday, the new Town Council was sworn in and chose its mayor and deputy mayor for the next two years.

There were no surprises, as the top two vote-getters typically become mayor and deputy mayor respectively, but it was also an opportunity to thank the voters, welcome the winners and commend one another for the good work that always transcends from one council to another.

Aiding in the ceremony were religious leaders Rev. Elizabeth Cummings of St Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Dr. Reza Mansoor, cardiologist and president of the Muslim Coalition of CT, and Rabbi Alan Lefkowitz of Temple Beth Torah.

Rev. Cummings thanked God for His guidance and asked Him to bless the fruits of the Town Council's work. Dr. Mansoor greeted the group with the Islamic greeting God's peace be with you all, noting that we are called upon to serve our neighbor as ourselves and to love our creator and sustainer with all our hearts.

After the new council was sworn in, Councilor Miki Duric nominated Ken Lesser as mayor, seconded by newly-elected Councilor Ken Weiner.

"Over the years, we have all seen Ken donate countless hours to improving our town, from supporting local businesses and community programs to listening with compassion to the concerns of every resident. Ken understands that our town's strength lies in its people," said Duric.

Weiner added that nobody lives the title of mayor like Lesser does. He was elected unanimously for another term.

Councilor Matthew Forrest nominated Councilor Jane Roets to become deputy mayor, the position that he had filled in the previous council, noting her kindness, her openness and her steady presence on the council. "But what truly defines her is the way she brings people together" he said. Her nomination was seconded by new Councilor Scott Wands.

"To have the confidence of both the voters as

well as my colleagues is truly humbling," Roets said of her unanimous acceptance.

"I love this job, and I love this town," Mayor Lesser said. He shared a story about two boys ages six and nine that he met when he was campaigning door-to-door this fall. They were inspired by the Scarecrows on Main and suggested to Lesser that Old Wethersfield might want to try a Snowmen on Main-themed event in the future.

"We put them on a committee with me and the town manager," Lesser recalled, "and they brought us a power point on this idea. Great ideas can come from any age," he said.

Rabbi Lefkowitz gave the benediction, which included a story about a man who spent all of his time studying the Torah and was failing to do the only thing his wife expected of him, which was to take out the garbage. An argument ensued, and they went to their rabbi to settle it, but he told them to go home and wait for his answer.

"It was a stormy night, but suddenly there was a knock on the door. The husband opened the door, and there stood the rabbi," he said. "The husband asked him why he was there. I'm here to take out your garbage, the rabbi said."

Rabbi Lefkowitz charged the Council that, "The true sign of greatness is someone who is not too great for anything."
